Re: Title XIX Behavioral Health Financial and Program Accountability

Dear Governor Ducey:

Pursuant to Laws 2013, Chapter 220, the Department of Child Safety is required to submit the enclosed financial and program accountability report to provide information on the Title XIX eligibility of children in foster care by county for the quarter ending June 30, 2015.

The total number of children in out-of-home placements who were enrolled in Title XIX rose throughout the quarter, reaching 16,230 by the end of June 2015, a 3.1 percent increase since December 2014 and a 21.9 percent increase since December 2013. Of the Title XIX-enrolled children at the end of June 2015, 10,360 resided in Maricopa County. During the quarter ending in June 2015, the Department expended \$1,913,476 on behavioral health placements and \$130,779 on behavioral health services for Title XIX-eligible children.

This report also includes updated expenditure figures for the second and third quarters of FY 2015. Amounts are presented according to month of service and are restated on each quarterly report to reflect the most up-to-date payment information.

A portion of Department expenditures for behavioral health placements and services are due to court orders. The Department continues to work with the juvenile justice and court systems to find solutions to the portion of behavioral health placements that are due to court orders. The Department also engages each Regional Behavioral Health Authority to create individualized plans for each child in DCS funded behavioral health placements.
