TRIBAL CONSULTATION ANNUAL REPORT July 1, 2016– June 30, 2017

DEPARTMENT OVERVIEW

The Arizona Department of Child Safety (DCS) is the single state administered child welfare services agency for Arizona, with a mission to successfully engage children and families to ensure safety, strengthen families, and achieve permanency. The DCS vision is that children thrive in family environments free from abuse and neglect.

TRIBAL LIAISON

DCS established the position of Inter-Governmental Tribal Liaison in 2014 in accordance with Executive Order 2006-14. The DCS Tribal Liaison has the responsibility of being the Department's point of contact for Arizona's 22 federally recognized Tribes, the urban Indian community, and for all federally recognized tribes throughout the United States that may have involvement in an Arizona DCS case. The Tribal Liaison is responsible for facilitating State-Tribal consultation and developing, maintaining, and improving communication between DCS and Tribes. In January 2017, Kenneth G. Poocha was hired as the Tribal Liaison. Mr. Poocha has been with the Department since 2013, serving as an Investigator in the Prescott Office. Prior to working for DCS, Mr. Poocha served as the Executive Director of the Arizona Commission of Indian Affairs, worked for several tribes, and worked in areas of health care, juvenile justice, education, and law enforcement. Mr. Poocha is of Hopi and Santa Ana Pueblo heritage and is an enrolled member of the Hopi Tribe.

TRIBAL GOVERNMENT CONSULTATION POLICY

DCS has an ongoing commitment to working with Arizona's Tribes to improve the quality, availability, and accessibility of services and resources to children, youth, and adults. The Department recognizes the importance of tribal collaboration and has worked diligently since becoming a stand-alone department to fulfill the obligations that were outlined in Executive Order 2006-14, which states in part [that] "All Executive Branch agencies shall develop and implement tribal consultation policies to guide their work and interaction with federally-recognized Tribes in Arizona" and "shall designate a member of their staff to assume responsibility for the department's implementation of the tribal consultation policy and to act as the principle point of contact for tribal issues." Pursuant to this Executive Order, the Department hired Kenneth G. Poocha as the DCS Intergovernmental Tribal Liaison on January 17, 2017 and finalized the Arizona DCS Tribal Consultation Policy on May 17, 2017.

The establishment of the Tribal Government Consultation Policy will afford a standard to provide open, continuous, and meaningful consultation with Arizona's 22 federally-recognized American Indian Tribes. The purpose is to provide the forum for information exchange and mutual understanding prior to taking actions that will likely have a direct impact on the American Indian Tribes in Arizona.

TRIBAL CONSULTATION ACTIVITIES AND PERFORMANCE MEASURES

Consultation and communication between DCS and Tribes are essential, and are especially important in the areas of contracts management, policies and procedures, Inter-Governmental Agreements (IGA), and

Indian Child Welfare Act case-related issues. The Tribal consultation activities and performance measures for SFY 2017 for DCS are listed in the following table.

Challenges

There have been no significant challenges to the Department in our efforts to provide quality consultation, communication, and collaboration with Arizona's tribal community. The vacancy in the Tribal Liaison position was rectified in January of 2017.

Legislative Changes

The only legislative change that may have an impact on tribal communities is SB 1003, which in some instances may require a court order for the Department of Child Safety to take a child into custody. The question at hand is whether or not a child located on a reservation or a non-Indian child residing and/or located on a reservation will require a court order from a tribal court
